Welcome to another edition of *Bush to Beach News*.

The last few months have once again been very busy in the CHRL office (hence the late newsletter). The Final Report for our Community Support Officer contract and the application for next years contract were both due in the space of one week. On top of this quite a few other funding opportunities arose during this period, all requiring input from CHRL staff. The final outcome of this is that CHRL has received funding from the **Northern Rivers Catchment Management Authority** to undertake a range of projects in the Coffs region. These include:

- **White Blackberry Control** - \$8000 has been allocated to remove known infestations of this emerging weed and map the distribution of this species in Coffs Harbour and Bellingen. So far dozens of sites have been treated in the Coffs Harbour and Bellingen area. **See p. 3 for more information.**
- **Coastal Community Group Storm Recovery Funding** - \$5000 has been received from the NRCMA to improve the short term health of the remaining fore dune vegetation after damage caused by recent storm events. Funded activities may include planting, temporary fencing, construction of dune forming fencing etc, but will not cover major structural activities. **For more details see p. 6.**
- **Flood Disaster River Restoration Program** - \$33100. This funding has been allocated to three sites within the Coffs area to undertake river restoration works after the recent flooding in the area.

We have also been fortunate enough to receive funding from the **Holiday Coast Credit Union**, through their *Community Partnerships Program*. \$900 was allocated to Coffs Harbour Regional Landcare to purchase a marquee for use at events and workshops. This is an item we have needed for some time as most of the community events we participate in seem to occur on wet weekends!

Our last piece of good news came in the announcements of successful recipients for the **Australian Governments Grants to Voluntary Environment and Heritage Organisations** (GVEHO) program. CHRL has received a contribution of \$3600 to go towards our administration costs. Although less than we asked for every bit counts.

Finally, on page 7 of this newsletter you will find a brief CHRL member survey. Please take the time to fill in this survey and drop it in or post it to the CHRL office. Copies of this survey will also be uploaded to the CHRL website over the coming days. The results of this survey will enable us to provide better support for our member groups in the years ahead.

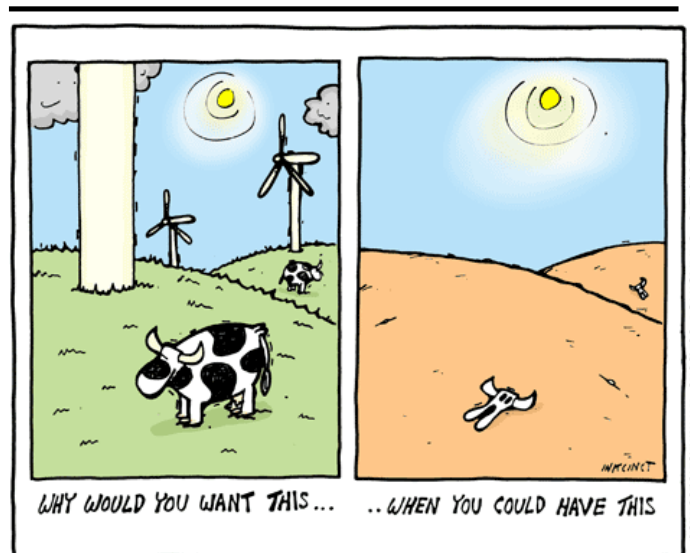
We have been busy in recent months holding displays at Woolgoolga Curryfest, Emerald Beach Fair and the Coffs Harbour show. These events are a great opportunity to educate the community on environmental issues and seek support for what we do. At the Coffs show our display was visited by Federal Minister Hon. Tony Burke, Minister for Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry. He spoke to us at length and was keen to hear our view on all of the relevant issues facing Landcare. He admitted that the Caring for our Country funding programme has some problems and assured us that they are working hard to address all of the issues raised by us and others. He complimented all of us on the good work we are doing and encouraged us to all remain focussed and active at what we do.

The CMA has offered a contract for Community Capacity Building in the Coffs Harbour Region. This contract is out for open tender and CHRL has lodged an expression of interest and proposal to take on the contract. This is the funding that supports our office and Community Support Officer. We have also lodged applications for Caring for our Country and Environmental Trust funding and are hopeful that we will gain enough funding to keep us functioning well.

We have been negotiating with Council and National Parks to establish a suitable memorial to honour Dee Wallace for all of the enthusiasm and hard work she put in to improving the natural environment of our region. We are hoping that the section of the coastal walkway south of Emerald Beach will be named in honour of Dee.

Finally, we are saddened to hear of the passing earlier this year of Michael Tointon, one of our hard working volunteers at Romney Close Reserve. He passed away suddenly following a short illness.

White Blackberry Funding

Future Workshops



Organic Farming on Small Acreages: This workshop will give an overview of organic farming and will give participants an understanding of the principles of organic farming, the process of certification, what you can and can't do as an organic producer and market and supply chains for organic produce. This workshop will take place in the first few weeks of August and will be advertised in the Coffs Coast Advocate and The Courier Sun.

Emerging Weeds on the Mid-North Coast: The aim of this workshop is to increase the profile of a number of emerging and potential weeds in the Mid-North Coast area. Samples of a variety of weed species will be available on the day to help participants improve their recognition skills and staff from CHRL, Coffs Harbour City Council and DECC will be available to discuss the management of emerging and new weed incursions.

Certified Bush Regeneration Training Days: Two certified bush regeneration training days will be run in the early part of next financial year for landcare volunteers in the Coffs Harbour area. These courses will be run in conjunction with NPWS, EnviTE, Coffs Harbour Bush Regeneration and CHRL. When the dates for these courses are confirmed a letter will be forwarded to all CHRL members.

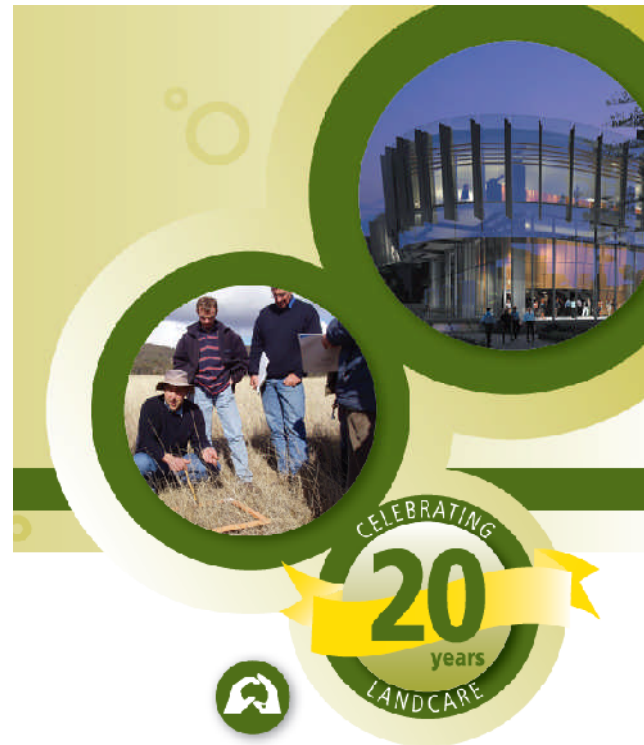
Landscapes, Communities and Resilience - Weathering Change

The Northern Rivers Catchment Management Authority and NSW Landcare are very proud and privileged to be hosting the 2009 NSW Landcare Forum. From its informal beginnings in the early 1980s, the Landcare movement has grown rapidly to include more than 4000 Landcare groups and 120,000 individual volunteers across Australia. At least 40% of landholders are involved in a Landcare group and its caring hands brand boasts 80% recognition across the country.

There are currently more than 1800 Landcare groups in NSW with hundreds of rural, industry, agriculture, community development, conservation and land management organisations active partners in local Landcare networks -recognition that good resource management is good for the environment and business.

The Forum, held every two years at different locations in NSW, is the premier event for landcarers in NSW bringing together around 400 natural resource managers, Landcare volunteers and landholders from across the state. The program will include presentations on indigenous involvement in natural resource management, resilient and productive ecosystems, impact of climate change on the agricultural sector and volunteering in the 21st century as well as a round-table discussion on the future of Landcare.

The Forum will involve expert speakers and presenters as well as field trips in the Port Macquarie area to local Landcare projects, a Local Government riparian protection project, a bush tucker tour and a biological and organic farm. This year's forum will also acknowledge and celebrate the achievements of the past 20 years of Landcare.



Some of the topics covered in this year's concurrent session are;

- soil health,
- littoral rainforests,
- *Caring for our Country* and the implications for Landcare,
- volunteering, and
- indigenous NRM.

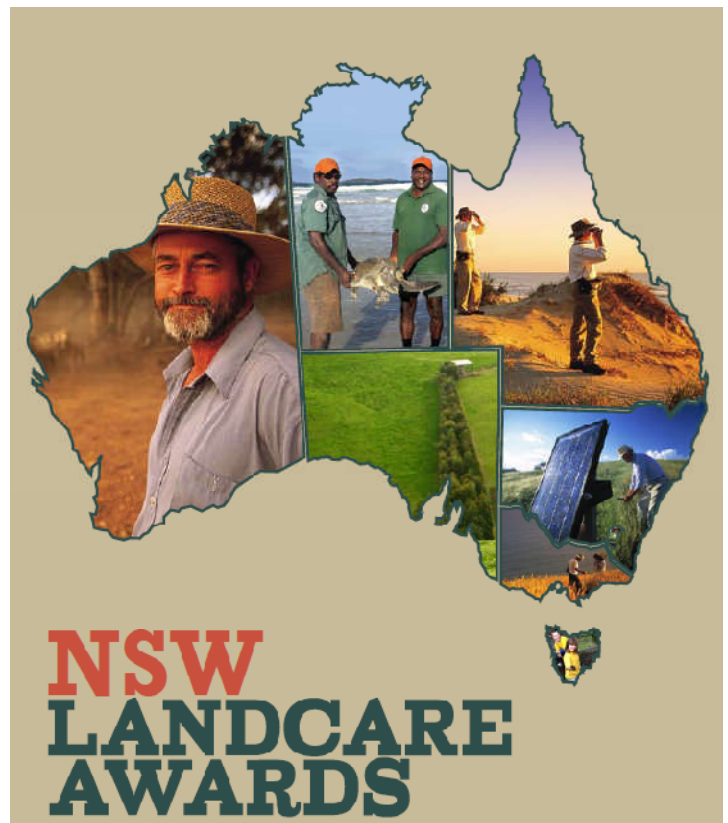


Landcare Australia Ltd has announced the categories for the **2009 NSW Landcare Awards** and the 2010 National Landcare Awards.

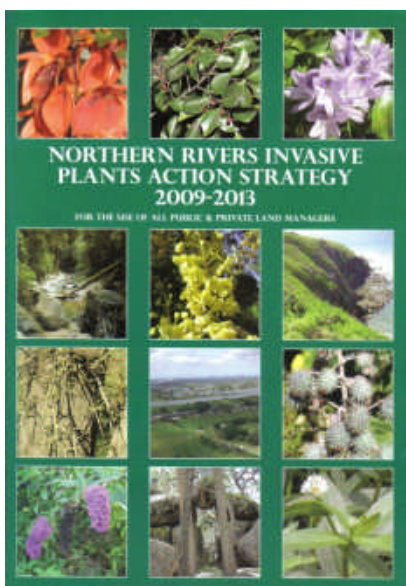

A Resource Kit for Rural Landholders In the Northern Rivers Region of NSW



The *Resource Kit for Rural Landholders in the Northern Rivers Region* has been produced by the Northern Rivers Landcare Network with funding from the **Australian Government Caring for Our Country** program and the **Northern Rivers Catchment Management Authority**.

The aim of this kit is to bring much of this information together in one easy to use guide for intending and existing landholders in the Northern Rivers region, and to direct them to where they can obtain further help.

The kit briefly describes the natural resources (soils, water, native vegetation and pastures) of the area and major factors that impact on them (climate, drought, flood, fire and weeds).

These play major roles in determining the potential and limitations of rural land and therefore, how the land needs to be managed. Copies of the Resource Kit can be obtained from the Coffs Harbour Regional Landcare office.

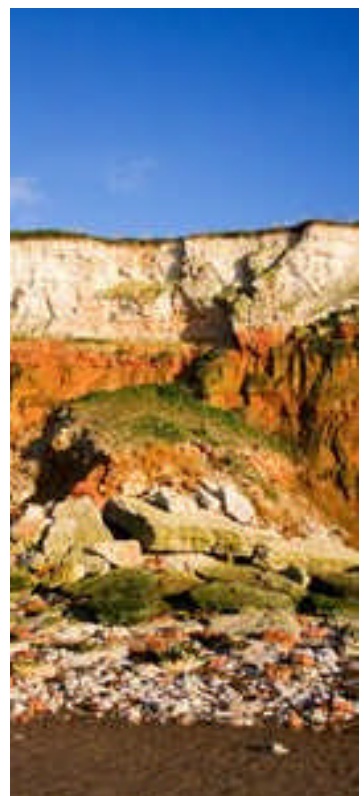
Coastal Community Group Storm Recovery Funding

CHRL has received \$5000 from the Northern Rivers CMA to support coastal community groups to protect and recover coastal areas following the recent severe storm events. These works should aim to improve the short-term health of remaining foredune vegetation, in order to maximise the sand trapping capacity of the foredune as sand returns to the beach in the medium term, and enhance dune resilience in the longer term. Activities might include, but are not restricted to:

- Fertilising and/or planting of the seaward or leading edge of the foredune
- Temporary fencing to restrict access and damage to foredune vegetation
- Construction of dune forming fences
- Seed and plant material collection, planting and/or propagation of species including sand spinifex, coastal wattle, lomandra and banksia as core coloniser species

Funds must not be used for major structural activities including beach access repair, dune reshaping with earthmoving equipment, and sand nourishment. Funds may be available for these activities through NSW Government disaster recovery funds.

NATIONAL NETWORK OF LANDCARE COORDINATORS TO CONTINUE

The Australian Government recently announced that the national network of local Landcare facilitators will continue, with a total \$33.6 million committed over four years.

Minister for Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry Tony Burke said the decision followed extensive discussions with local Landcare groups and strong representations from a number of MPs. From next year, up to \$8.4 million will be provided annually under *Caring for our Country* to fund up to 56 Landcare coordinator positions across Australia.

The coordinators will work closely with producers to help them continue work improving the sustainable management of their farm businesses. They will promote sustainable farming practices, to help secure the productivity of agriculture in the face of climate change.

Mr Burke said since becoming minister he had spent as much time as possible with people who work the land, on their land. "Farmers have consistently told me this Landcare network is the social glue as well as an important sustainable farming initiative," Mr Burke said. "Landcare was established by the Hawke Labour Government in 1989 and now we estimate around three-quarters of Australian farmers are involved or benefit from the shared knowledge.

"Rural and regional communities place an immense value on this network but the funding had not been continued under *Caring for our Country*. "It is my job to listen to their concerns and ensure we now deliver the funding so these people can keep working as links in their communities.

"I thank the local members who have worked hard to represent their Landcare groups on this issue and also the groups who sat down with me to talk the issue through in detail. "Linked with important research we are funding into soil and livestock emissions and climate change adaptation, this network will help to make the agricultural sector even more resilient."

The coordinators will link and support Landcare and production groups involved in sustainable farming practices and on-farm natural resource management.

From next year, coordinator positions will be funded under an open, competitive process to ensure broad representation across different regions and agricultural industries.

Coffs Harbour Show

Coffs Harbour Regional Landcare coordinated a combined display at the Coffs Harbour Show in conjunction with the **NRCMA, DECC, The Orara River Restoration Project, The Mid-North Coast Indian Myna Project** and **WetlandCare Australia**. The display outlined the variety of projects that Landcare undertakes in the Coffs Harbour region and outlined the strong partnerships that have been developed between state agencies and community members. **Tony Burke, the Minister for Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry** opened the Coffs Harbour Show this year and spent considerable time with staff from CHRL, NRCMA and WetlandCare discussing the difficulties that had arisen with the change from *Envirofund* to *Caring for our Country*. It was pleasing to see the level of understanding the Minister had for the issues the change had created – we can only hope that this will now translate into meaningful changes in the next *Caring for our Country* Business Plan, due out towards the end of this year.

Sustainable Grazing for Small Farms workshop

Do you run a few head of cattle or a small mob of sheep on your place? Are you thinking about buying a couple of goats or letting your neighbours agist some of their livestock on your land to earn a few extra dollars? Have you ever wondered what the difference between set stocking and rotational grazing is?

Bellinger Landcare is holding a workshop on sustainable grazing systems for small acreage. Local DPI agronomists Carol Rose and Tac Campbell will present this half-day workshop on a small farm at Brierfield on a Saturday morning. Together they will talk about the multiple benefits of sustainable grazing, including potential cost savings, and why there is no 'one size fits all' approach to managing pastures and livestock.

The workshop will briefly cover whole property planning and ask some questions about which grazing system is best for your situation, that is – your livestock, your pasture and soils and your budget. Tac will help assess the pros and cons of a range of different grazing models and there'll be plenty of time for questions on all the various schools of thought.

After morning tea, there'll be a farm walk to look at a sustainable grazing system in practice and Carol and Tac will talk about the sort of infrastructure you might need, like fencing and watering points; as well as some of the other considerations involved in setting up your own sustainable grazing system.

The workshop will run from 9:00am to 1:00pm on Saturday 4th July at a local property in Brierfield, south west of Bellingen. Morning tea will be provided so all you need to bring is a hat, some boots and a raincoat, just in case.

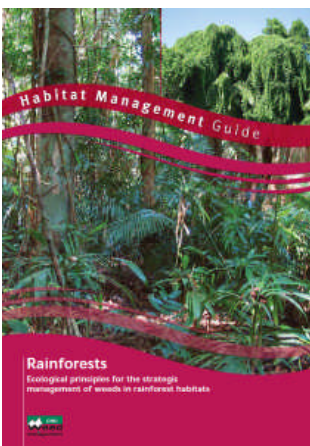

Habitat Management Guides



Ecological principles for the strategic management of weeds in rainforest habitats.

The goal of this publication is to provide general **ecological principles** for strategic level management of weeds. It is *not* intended to provide 'operational' recommendations. This publication focuses on the ecology of weed species in rainforest habitats and the overall ecological role of weeds within a broad landscape context. The principles proposed are aimed at identifying and managing important ecological processes so as to minimise weed introduction and spread.

Weed management in riparian areas: south-eastern Australia

These guidelines are designed to provide assistance to managers of riparian areas in planning their weed management programs, and in so doing, highlight some of the challenges inherent in riparian weed management. Background material about riparian areas and the weed species typically found in them is provided. The steps required to develop an effective riparian weed management program are described. These steps outline general principles but do not provide management prescriptions for individual weed species or riparian sites. As there is considerable variation in riparian areas across Australia, these guidelines focus on the types of river systems predominantly found in south-eastern Australia. While complementing other recent weed management guidelines, the information in this document highlights the central role played by water flow, particularly flooding, in shaping riparian areas and their weed management.

New Worksites

Stingray Creek Community Bushcare



Stingray Creek Community Bushcare held its first planting day since receiving their “*Caring for Our Country Community Coastcare Grant*”. Coffs Harbour Bush Regenerators have been following the Vegetation Management Plan which EnviTE had prepared at the start of the year and despite the very wet conditions they have made a lot of progress weeding in and around the **Littoral Rainforest** and invasive molasses grass area. Saturday afternoon (13th June) saw 15 keen and mostly new bush carers arrive for an introduction into planting native seedlings, staking, bagging and using mulch mats. Excitement was shared when the first plantings showed the soil to be dark, moist and full of earthworms. It was a fantastic warm afternoon for planting with ocean views as we all got down to the job. We had a couple of teenagers keen to participate on the day and a visit from Pat and May our own Moonee Elders helping to pad the soil down around our new Stingray Creek Bushcare signs.

Bakker Drive Reserve Landcare

Bakker Drive residents have come together recently to help improve the condition of their local reserve. So far 23 residents have joined the group with work focusing on;

- the staged removal of *Camphor Laurel* along **Burgess Creek**,
- the enhancement of the vegetation in the riparian zones through the promotion of natural regeneration and when appropriate supplementary planting with locally occurring native species,
- the promotion of Landcare activities and increasing community volunteer involvement in the area, and,
- controlling the impacts of public access on the native vegetation.

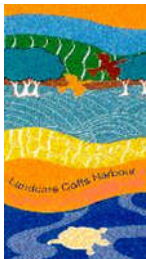
